Pastor Doug's Letter

Greetings Good People,

Summer has begun. Memorial Day weekend is behind us. Schools are out. Sunday School is on vacation. Time for Fun, Fun, Fun in the Sun. Summer is also a time when suggestions of good summer reads come out.

When I read Bishop Daniel's weekly column, he always has a list of what he is reading and listening to. He spends at least an hour every morning reading scholarly books. He also practices centering prayer and listens to podcasts. So, I have some suggestions you might consider. These are books I am reading by some of my favorite authors.

I have just finished rereading *Run with the Horses: The Quest for Life at Its Best*, by Eugene Peterson (InterVarsity Press, 1983). I have read nearly all of his 30 books. He was a Presbyterian pastor (died 2018) who is best known for his Bible paraphrase, *The Message*. Eugene invited people to live a robust faith in an age of religious shallowness and consumerism. *Run with the Horses* explores how the prophet Jeremiah lived out that faith in an era not unlike our own. It is 16 chapters long, and each is about 15 pages (I did about one every day or so).

I am currently rereading for the third time *The Universal Christ: How a Forgotten Reality Can Change Everything We See, Hope For, and Believe*, by Richard Rohr (2019, Convergent Books). Richard's incarnational theology is expansive and liberating, for he sees Christ everywhere instead of only in the historical Jesus. This book sums up his teaching and practices. The first book of his I read was *Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life*, which describes how great love or great suffering transforms the first half of life that is structured into the second half of life which pours out blessing.

I also read his daily meditations (<u>https://cac.org/email-sign-up/</u>) and am listening to his podcast **Another Name for Every Thing**, which is conversation with Richard on the themes of **The Universal Christ** (<u>https://cac.org/podcast/another-name-for-every-thing/</u>). At times, his dialogue partners can be a bit smarmy, but he tells great stories.

I am slowly working my way through **The Way of Paradox: Spiritual Life as Taught by Meister Eckhart** by Cyprian Smith. A bit deep for most people, Meister Eckhart (c. 1260 – c. 1328) was a German Catholic theologian, philosopher and mystic. I highly recommend **Meister Eckhart's Book of the Heart: Meditations for the Restless Soul** by Jon Sweeney, and Mark Burrows (2017, Hampton Roads Publishing) because it is more accessible. Each page is a short sentence for contemplation. For example, page 3:

Opening the Heart's Door

Ours is not the work of seeking You here or there where we think You might be, but of opening the heart's door, and when we do this You cannot resist coming in, since our opening and Your entering are one: You knock and wait, and when we open we find that You were there all along and will not leave us.

Once a week I get the Weekly Playlist on the **Sermon on the Mount** from the Bible Project. There is a new translation of a portion of Jesus' words, commentary by Jon and Tim, and a video. I highly recommend downloading the series on your computer or adding the app to your phone (<u>https://bibleproject.com/</u>).

I am also rereading **Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion**, by Gregory Boyle. Father Greg works with the gangs in Los Angles and is the founder of Homeboy Industries. He tells story after story of how compassion transforms lives that most people see as unredeemable.

There you go. Some books, podcasts and an app. Enjoy.

- June 31 Water is somewhere in the story.

TIPS FOR DONATING TO LOCAL FOOD PANTRIES:

- If you have a large amount of produce, please call in advance to let the food bank know that you are coming.
- No rotten produce. If you can't eat it, pantry clients can't eat it!
- Offer only good quality, freshly picked produce to food pantries.
- Handle fresh fruits and vegetables safely to minimize the risk of foodborne illness.
- Don't mix produce types. Keep each type in separate, clean containers or bags.
- Clean as much mud and dirt as possible off the produce you plan to donate.
- Choose produce without mold, spoilage, bruising, or insects.

Shut-in Ministry Tips

Send notes every 6 weeks

- Tell of something interesting at church, like something cute during kids' sermon.
- Remind them of activities of different church members, such as Chad Doll serving as Council President or church members who coach a sport/play a sport.
- Explain how the **Gathering Space** is being utilized before and after worship for coffee and fellowship, and that the youth have enjoyed making hot chocolate and tea.
- Say one thing you're doing right now (gardening, jogging, wrapping gifts, studying for exam etc.).
- "Paint word pictures" so they have a glimpse of life outside their four walls.

Monthly phone calls/Visit

- 5–10-minute calls, so they don't tire.
- Ask about their grandchildren/great-grandchildren.
- Tell what your children/grandchildren are doing.
- Talk about a recipe you recently made and ask if they have some old favorites.
- Explain that handicapped and family restrooms have been added close to the sanctuary.
- Ask if they have flowers, snow, or bird feeders outside of their windows.
- Inquire if they have prayer concerns.
- Close by saying you will check in with them next month and ask if there is a time of day they preferred being called.
- Deliver Christmas, Easter or Pentecost flowers from church.
- Take bulletin/large print devotional booklet from church.

Take Communion

- Secure portable pre-filled cups from church in sacristy fridge in room behind the organ.
- Deliver a Sunday bulletin.
- Ask if they got the newsletter, and if they would like it if they are not receiving it. Then notify the church office.
- Ask about their favorite hymns and if they would like them played on YouTube with you.
- Ask if they have prayer concerns.

How to Serve at Sunday Worship Services

Below is an updated guide to serve at worship in a consistent fashion.

Please arrive before 10:00 am, except for the Fellowship Server who needs to arrive by 9:00 am in June, July & August.

What to do:

Greeters: You are the welcoming face of the church. Please stand at the door entrance assigned to you. Open the door, **SMILE** at each person, shake their hand, say, "Welcome to St. Mark's," and greet them by name if you know them.

Bulletins/Offering Folks: Before the worship service, one bulletin person should stand near the Pearl St. greeter and the other should stand near the sanctuary entrance by the courtyard. Please give each person a bulletin, smile, welcome them, and greet them by name if you know them. During the worship service you are also requested to **pass out the offering plates**. We are doing the offering differently now. All four of you will come and stand at the bottom of the steps at the conclusion of the musical offering. Pastor will hand each one of you an offering plate. You will collect the offering from **the front to back**. Two will go down the center aisle. The other two will go down the side aisles. If it is just a single person in the pew, you can hold the plate and collect it. If they pass the plate, receive it and start it back down the next aisle. When you have finished the collection, two will bring the four plates forward and give them to the pastor.

Fellowship Server: Please arrive at 9:00 am to make coffee in June, July, and August. (If you cannot do so, notify the pastor.) Instructions on how to prepare everything can be found below the microwave. After the fellowship time, serving treats of your choice, please empty and rinse all coffee urns and the water dispenser, as well as wipe off counters and tables.

Reader: Any special instructions are sent to you with that day's reading, including where to find pronunciations for unfamiliar Biblical words. Please practice reading the text **aloud** several times prior to worship so that you can become familiar with the inflections that will make the text come alive.

Song Leader: The Order of Worship is emailed to you so that you may practice the songs.

Communion Servers: Please come forward during the singing of the offertory. When you hold out the tray of wine and grape juice, please stand four to five feet away from the pastor, which is close to the piano on the lectern side and in the middle of the pews on the pulpit side. Smile, look each person in the eye, and say, "The blood of Christ shed for you."

Sound Tech: Please make sure that the pastor's microphone is turned off during the singing. However, his microphone and the singer's microphone need to be turned on during the responses, such as during the reading of the psalm, so that the responses will be audible for the video stream.

June 22 & 23 Joseph's Brothers Go to Egypt Youth Sunday Psalm 56 Genesis 42:1-28 Regaining Broken Trust

When do you trust a person who has seriously harmed you? Joseph dealt with that question when his brothers—who had sold him into slavery—came to buy food from him in the midst of a devastating famine.

June 29 & 30 The Reconciliation of Joseph and His Brothers Psalm 39:1-7 Genesis 45:1-15 Forgiving Until You Forget

Is it possible to forget the wrong that a person has done? Should you? Have you truly forgiven a person if you still remember the wrong?

St. Mark's Lutheran Church Council April 18, 2024, Meeting Minutes

Laura Heitz called the meeting to order at 6:58 PM.

Members Present: Laura Heitz, Mark Swaney, Pastor Doug, JP Metz, Shelley Koch, Dustin Jeanneret, and Mike Burton via phone.

Pastor Doug opened with a devotional reading from Acts 17 and concluded with a prayer.

Council Meeting Minutes: The minutes were emailed to all the members. Mark Swaney made a motion to approve the minutes, JP Metz seconded; motion carried.

Financial Report: Mike Burton presented the treasury report. The balance in checking is currently \$202,503. Liabilities were reflecting some unusual numbers which Paul Rogers was able to clean up. The dedicated funds balance is \$84,348.

The capital improvement (Line 05) sits at \$41,767. Line 53 reflects a balance of \$9,268, which will be transferred into line 5. The YTD General Fund receipts as of March 31 were \$61,841. The YTD General Fund expenses were \$56,847; we are ahead of the budget. We have a positive cash flow of \$4,994.

JP Metz made a motion to accept the treasury report, Mark Swaney seconded; motion carried.

Pastor's Report: The new member orientation was postponed due to planning conflicts. Pastor Doug's summer vacation dates will come out in the near future.

Old Business: The quote for insurance was sent out and has now been signed. The Sexual Acts Coverage was increased to one million dollars. Mike Burton made a motion to accept as presented and as adjusted, Dustin Jeanneret seconded; motion carried.

Mike Burton has inspected the Child and Youth Abuse Prevention Policy line for line. The council thoroughly discussed the policy and decided upon a small adjustment to include vendors/contractors to have a background check.

Pastor Doug, Shelly Koch, and Laura Heitz moved to accept the adjustment; JP Metz seconded; motion carried.

After consideration, the council will not be implementing the worship family suggestion that came from the strategic planning committee.

New Business: A complaint was made about the LED sign being too small in comparison to the original sign holder box. Dustin Jeanneret offered to research and price out larger alternatives.

The council discussed planning a celebration for when the renovation loans are paid off.

Shelly Koch made a motion to adjourn, Mark Swaney seconded; motion carried.

The next meeting will be on May 16th, 2024 @ 7PM

St. Mark's Lutheran Church Council May 17, 2024, Meeting Minutes

Laura Heitz called the meeting to order at 7:06 PM.

Members Present: Laura Heitz, Mark Swaney, Pastor Doug, Mike Burton, JP Metz, Shelley Koch, and Dustin Jeanneret.

Devotional: Pastor Doug led council in a devotional on Corinthians 12:1-13 and a prayer.

Council Meeting Minutes: The minutes were emailed to all the members. JP Metz made a motion to approve the minutes, Mark Swaney seconded; motion carried.

Financial Report: Mike Burton presented the Treasurer's report. Our savings and checking accounts currently amount to \$128,330. The Betty Winemiller Endowment CD of \$6,000 has been added to our Investment Portfolio.

The monthly income was \$17,410, and YTD, it was \$79,251. We are right where we need to be with the Synod Support percentage.

The insurance was overbudget because we've made some extra payments to the new insurance company to get started. Property/maintenance was overbudget because of repair projects (such as redoing pipes and fixing the preschool bathrooms). However, these overbudget amounts should equal back out.

In June, St. Marks will be paying the remainder of the renovation loans: \$81,577.

Mark Swaney made a motion to accept the finance report, JP Metz seconded; motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Council further discussed the Ministry Family concept. Mike Burton made a motion that the strategic planning committee reactivate for the purpose of implementing the small group recommendation. Mark Swaney seconded; motion carried.

This Sunday, May 19, we bless the 2024 Wapakoneta High School Graduates: Sarah Garber, Erika Lisi, and Ryan Price. This day is also the last Sunday for Sunday School. Laura will prepare thank you gifts to present to the teachers on June 2.

Everyone is invited to a meeting on Sunday, June 2 at 9:30 in room 2, the music room, to debrief this year's Sunday School experience.

The New Beginnings Learning Academy Graduation is Friday, May 24, at 6:30 pm.

Elaine Hawkins is a superb Administrative Assistant.

Pastor met with Dustin and the sign donor at 6 pm before the council meeting to determine the best replacement sign that will be larger and clearer.

Laura Heitz has volunteered to lead a photo directory planning committee.

Pastor Doug has asked Elaine to re-do the phone directory and to work up a proposal for the purchase of a cell phone for use in receiving the Venmo transactions and for contacting the youth and others with volunteer reminder notifications.

Elaine Hawkins has been collecting the acknowledgements that they have read the Sexual Misconduct Policy. Everyone who works with our children and youth have signed and returned their acknowledgements.

As of May 15, we have \$29,861 of pledges yet to be paid. Pastor Doug estimates that \$2,070 will never come in due to changing financial situations. Pastor Doug estimates the rest of them will be paid—but most not until the end of the year and some even into next year.

Pastor Doug vacation dates are June 3-14 and July 1-8. On June 8 & 9, worship services will be conducted by Pastor Mick Althauser, and on Sunday, July 7, they will be conducted by Pastor Ken Pollitz. Saturday night, July 6, will probably be a video sermon.

Old Business:

A much larger outdoor HD LED sign has been purchased.

The Celebration Meal at the repayment of the Renovation Loans was discussed.

New Business:

The church photo directory planning committee will be organized by Laura Heitz.

The proposed cell phone purchase (Apple iPhone SE \$429) with a cellular plan named Visible by Verizon which is \$25/mo. that includes unlimited talk, text, and data with no monthly or startup fee and no contracts was discussed. Pastor Doug made a motion to accept the purchase and plan, JP Metz seconded; motion carried.


